On Thursday we celebrate Human Rights Day, also known as Sharpeville day. It originally commemorated the police firing on a crowd of 7000 demonstrators, killing 69 people with some shot in the back as they fled. Now we “celebrate” human rights in our country on this day. We are approaching 30 years of freedom from the yoke of apartheid, but still, we see prejudice and injustice around us.

- † For ourselves, that we may be aware of any inadvertent unjust acts we may have committed and need to set right.
- † For the war situation in Ukraine and Gaza, where so many abuses are taking place, the bombing of hospitals and civilian buildings, the destruction of places of worship.
